Students will be rewarded over the next few weeks with vouchers, certificates and positive text messages home. "At the start of the day, I met new people and people that my dad works with and went to the factory. After I went with one of my dad's colleagues who is the raw materials specialist to learn about what they did. What they do is that they check the raw materials and no illegal food colourings and there is no unwanted things in the food and also that that it is reliable and sustainable.
About halfway through the day I went with my dad to see another one of his colleagues and then I went with another to so what they do. They see what foods needs to be ordered in and when. My dad has to order the food and try and save money for the company.
At the end of the day, I was given the chance to be able to go down to the lab where they test food flavours, and I was able to try some different flavoured bourbons and custard creams that haven't been released yet like bat berry and poison apple."
