April 2023 marks four years since we became Principals of Minsthorpe Community College and you won't be surprised to hear that we feel proud and privileged to lead this wonderful College.





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On Wednesday 1st March the College welcomed Tom Bennett for a full day visit to our site. Tom is the Independent Behaviour Advisor to the DfE, as well as founder of ResearchEd (an institution which aims to bridge the gap between research and practice in education) and a published author, including his most recent title 'Running the Room', a practical guide to behaviour management. Tom spent the day observing lessons and social times.

lessons and social times, meeting with students and various groups of staff. The day culminated in an excellent training session for all staff centred around how we create, maintain and develop a truly excellent behaviour culture within schools and the significant impact this has on students' academic outcomes, well-being and their day-to-day experience of being in school. We were delighted with the overwhelmingly positive feedback we received from Tom in terms of our ongoing and relentless aim of ensuring that the behaviour and culture within our College is at its optimum and that all students feel safe at College and enjoy a positive experience. Tom stated that out of approximately 700 schools he has visited he would rate us within the top 5% in terms of behaviour! Mrs Read. Associate Assistant Principal commented, 'We have taken much from Tom's visit and will continue to focus on our key aims and aspirations in this area. Well done to all our staff and students and thank you to our parents/carers for the part they play.'

WHY STUDY LANGUAGES

This half term, Year 8 students have been exploring the benefits, advantages and transferable skills that learning a language can bring. Students have then worked hard in groups to carry out research on this topic and present their findings to their peers. The students have articulated themselves well in their "Why Study Languages" presentations and the MFL team have been extremely impressed.







In Science, the Year 8 ASPIRE cohort took part in an interactive STEM workshop run by English Football League (EFL) Championship assistant referee Mark Dwyer. The session called 'Help the Ref', has been designed by the PGMOL to bring referees from the Premier League and EFL into classrooms to promote their values of integrity, courage, accountability, and innovation. The students got to see what kit the current referees use on the field of play and how technology has led to improvements in equipment with things like goal line technology, vanishing spray and the communication headsets. After watching an inspiring and interactive presentation the students then worked in small groups to design their own piece of refereeing kit that they hope could be used on the field of play in the future. After using their STEM skills and working as a team in a time pressured environment, just like the PGMOL officials on a matchday, the ASPIRE students then gave engaging spoken presentations in the 'Referees Den' to pitch their new equipment to the rest of the group.

The excellent designs included heated shirts, hologram red and yellow cards, interactive assistant referee flags and electronic notebooks linked into the big screen. The students worked hard and had an enjoyable afternoon seeing how STEM can be used in the world of sport to develop equipment

and how it is then used on a match day at elite level.

The student feedback from the event was extremely positive – "It helped me to see how learning from our science lessons is useful in real everyday life and it made it interesting." "I don't like football, but it was still really good and I'd give it 9.5 out of 10 because I enjoyed thinking about how to make things better." and "I feel really enthusiastic now. It was good to have people come and ask me about my ideas."

SCIENCE FAIR







In January sixty students from Year 8 took part in the annual Science Fair in the main hall of college. The students acted as stallholders at the fair, where they displayed the results of their investigations into a project entitled "Connections" in line with British Science Week. The students spent 5 weeks researching and planning their investigations at home and on the day, they presented their models, posters and research reports to their peers, parents, and teachers.

As always, the standards were really high, and Mrs Merritt and Mr Gilmore had a tricky decision to make when they were asked to pick winners. In the end Ellie was chosen as the winner from Davy for her interactive work on senses and how they work in the human body. Jack was chosen from Moore due to his amazing volcano model that showed how we were connected to the liquid lava under the ground. Overall though the winner of the event was Austin for his incredible model of the eyes which showed how they were connected to the head as they moved around. All three students took home vouchers for their efforts and Austin was the proud recipient of the Science Fair Trophy.

National Careers Week started with a presentation from Dr Charlotte Woodford from Cambridge University. The presentation was to highlight the importance of foreign languages and the EBACC pathway to our Aspire pathway students.

Dr Woodford spoke about how research has shown that multilinguals are better problem solvers, creative thinkers, and excellent communicators. She gave an example of Manchester United football Marcus Rashford learning Spanish - "Football has given me the opportunity to travel to different countries, and you have certain countries you like and want to learn more about, and learning a language is definitely a part of that."

Rationale: the better he can communicate with other players the better his football will be.

interactive" Backstage Academy said "Easy to engage with students"


Lesley Francis said "Always enjoy coming to this event, really great students who engage in conversation" WDH said "It was great to have so many engaging students"

Business people from all over the district have volunteered to support this activity, students have prepared a CV, that the interviewers will feed backon and then also ask them a series of questions.

WORLD BOOK DAY 2023



We celebrated World Book Day on Thursday 2nd March 2023 by focusing upon literature about children in all subjects across the curriculum, using the Whole College Reading Policy to predict the narratives, understand the texts and pin down the plot and themes. World Book Day is a national opportunity for schools across the country to celebrate the past, present and future of children's literature and promote reading for pleasure. Every student at Minsthorpe received an e-voucher for a book of their own or a £1 reduction from a full price title through their student





email.

All students were given the opportunity to read extracts from some inspirational literature in every lesson throughout the day. The three novels all dealt with children facing different challenges, whether they were around their feelings of sympathy, love or fear. We studied extracts from 'The Darkest Minds' by Alexandra Bracken, 'The Hunger Games', by Suzanne Collins, and 'Great Expectations' by Charles Dickens. As always, the class discussions which followed from this collaborative reading were mature, insightful and engaging.

The English Team celebrated by dressing up as their favourite literary characters, including Mrs Lyons from 'Blood Brothers', Lennie from 'Of Mice and Men', the three witches from 'Macbeth'. Katniss Everdeen from 'The Hunger Games', Miss Trunchbull from 'Matilda', as well as students from Hogwarts and 'Lord of the Flies'. Mrs Smith in the library also hosted a range of fun activities at snack breaks.
