







STEM OUTREACH

looked at how taste testing using professional scales and measurements work. The students all thoroughly enjoyed it and were a credit to the college.



In September the MFL department celebrated the European Day of Languages, which is a day where the countries of Europe celebrate languages and language learning. Most MFL classes that day discussed the benefits of language learning and looked at languages around the world. We also had a special European Day of Languages event after school, where the students who attended enjoyed a quiz, a treasure hunt and plenty of European themed treats.

On Monday 14th November, our Year 8 Aspire students attended a session with MFL speakers from Burberry. The speakers talked about their roles within Burberry and the importance and advantages of studying French/languages within the company. The students really impressed the Burberry staff and were all really great ambassadors for the college, speaking really politely and asking great questions.

Throughout this year a number of Year 11 GCSE French students have been attending a GCSE Masterclass every Wednesday morning from 8:10-8:40 with Miss Hartley. The students have been very committed and motivated in the sessions during which the students have been developing higher GCSE skills, vocabulary and grammar in French. They have also enjoyed a little French breakfast while they worked! (du café, du jus de fruit, des pains au chocolat et des brioches).









LEARNING IN STEPBACK

This term the students have been reading Cirque de Freak and they have produced some amazing work based on the story. Their recall is fantastic, and they are thoroughly enjoying the book. The students are working really hard and love to see other staff. Mrs Berry and Mrs Trewinnard have the pleasure of delivering core subjects and the students engage really well.

The group has visited the library on Monday mornings and the students absolutely loved the first session in there. This is such a treat for the group!













YEAR 7'S EMBRACING KNOWLEDGE ORGANISERS





Beginning any new school year can be challenging especially when you are a Year 7 student taking your first steps into secondary school. Moving between classes, new friends and deciding which extracurricular event to take part in are all part of the journey. Home Learning, for many students, is also something new. Despite our expectations at Minsthorpe being high, Year 7 have certainly risen to them.

Students in Year 7 are expected to use their Knowledge Organisers to revise a key subject or subjects every single night. As Knowledge Organisers contain all of the core knowledge in all of the

students' subject area, we are especially pleased to see the vast amounts of Year 7 students submitting their Home Learning every single week. We have been inundated by Mind Maps, detailed notes using the Look Cover Write Check Correct method and even flashcards on lanyards. It has been brilliant to see not iust students completing Home Learning, but parents and careers supporting them to do so. By the time Year 7 reach Year 11 they will be able to **Know More**. Remember More and ultimately **Do More**.

Year 7 have been building up to their half-termly Knowledge Assessments. Year 7's behaviour was impeccable as they entered computer rooms in a mature, orderly and focused fashion. They were a credit to our school. Results were equally impressive. The average Year 7 score out of 160 was 102. This meant that the majority of Year 7 students answered 64% of the questions correctly. This is an amazing start and the whole college is proud of Year 7's conduct, effort and achievement.

At the start of the halfterm, we held a celebration assembly where we rewarded students with certificates and vouchers for their various successes. There were rewards for Home Learning, answering 100% of the questions correctly





in one subject area and the top 50 students in Year 7. After the next Knowledge Assessment on **Wednesday 4th January**, we will also be celebrating any student who has improved their score and be giving out a reward for the student who improves the most.

The **motivation**, commitment and care

students have demonstrated towards their Home Learning is exemplary. We would also like to thank and commend the students going above and beyond week in week out to improve their Home Learning submissions. Well done to those attending Home Learning club for extra guidance and to those receiving Knowledge Tutoring for working so diligently. This is a team effort and we cannot wait to report more successes in the future!



HUDDERSFIELD UNIVERSITY VISIT

30 students from 12.3 enjoyed a visit to Huddersfield University. We arrived at 9.45am and spent an enjoyable day learning about the day to day life of a university student. First up the students had a session introducing Higher Education and discovering how and when to apply for student finance. They learnt about the different loans and bursaries that could be applied for.

Next up the university had a student panel where our students were allowed to ask questions. The students asked some great questions and the panel's answers were good, giving a lot of insight into their lives as students.

We then went on a tour of the campus, visiting many different department areas, including medical and law. After dinner students took part in a budgeting activity where they planned how they would manage their finances whilst studying at university. The students were excellent throughout the day.

SCIENCE CLUB

This term students have had the opportunity to investigate a range of chemical reactions and biological processes.

We celebrated Bonfire Night by making our own versions of fireworks, students learnt how different elements burn with a characteristic coloured flame. For Halloween, we made balloons scream, utilising centripetal force of motion of irregular objects to cause different vibrations within the balloons.

Students discovered the

structure of DNA, making their own models, but also had the chance to extract actual DNA from kiwi fruit. The DNA forms a thick gelatinous polymer that was isolated at the top of their test tubes.

In our latest session students were able to act as formulation scientists and make bath bombs using a range of different chemicals, colours and scents.

YEAR 7 GIRLS FOOTBALL VISIT TO ST GEORGE'S PARK



At the beginning of the year trials were held for the year 7 girls football team, with over 25 talented girls putting themselves forward to represent Minsthorpe Community College. This makes girls football one of the biggest females represented sports in the college!

As part of the year 7 football programme the girls get an exciting opportunity to visit England's iconic training facilities at St George's Park. The girls relished this exciting opportunity, as they get to see where their heroes prepare for their fixtures as part of the England set up, view the world class facilities, and participate in a high-level coaching session lead by an England Football coach. On the day the girls represented Minsthorpe Community

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College in a very professional way by promoting our College ethos of motivation, commitment, and care, alongside impressing the leading coach who was

blown away by the ability and commitment the girls showed during the training session. As part of the tour the girls visited the boot room, where both the male and female England players would prepare themselves prior to their long training sessions. Following this, they

were taken to the breath-taking indoor 4G football arena which boasts a full side football pitch, spectator seating and a separate warm up area. The girls could not resist

getting involved straight away and volunteered themselves to do a vigorous warm up which included using the spin bikes and short shuttle sprints up and down the indoor running track adjacent to the 4G pitch. After this

the girls were led outside to the mock Wembly pitch, which is where all the England first team train prior to their upcoming fixtures. After learning more about the facilities, the girls were given an extremely rare opportunity and were invited onto the pitch for a closer look and a team photo.

After the tour had finished the girls got themselves stuck into a high-level coaching session where they not only learnt a lot of new skills, but also dazzled the coaches with their ability and passion for the game. The session lasted for 90 minutes and despite the cold temperatures and circling wind, the girls could not get enough and challenged each other every step of the way.



The day ended by visiting the team hotel where the girls had the chance to wind down and enjoy a warm drink while looking at memorabilia of England's history. Following this the girls could not resist the opportunity to take home some souvenirs of their amazing day out, with all of them purchasing England memorabilia from the gift shop. This was a fantastic day for the girls, and it certainly inspired and motivated them more to carrying on playing football at a high standard.





YEAR 11 SHINE TRIP

On the 23rd of September our Year 11 Shine cohort went to the University of York for the final time, this session was all based around life after Year 11. During the day students attended three different workshops all specialised in different areas of Further and Higher Education. Starting off with " I Can Cope" this was run by a lecturer from the university on different ways students can cope with the upcoming stress from exams, offering

We then moved in to the "Post 16 options sessions" where all the different qualifications were explained and how choosing the right options now can have a major impact on choices they make when they're older. Before students went home staff from the Shine project went through a career and skills session giving last little bits of information about future choices and wished our students all the best for this big year ahead. Overall the day was brilliant from start to end, really offered our students valuable knowledge regarding their next stage in education. The students were a real credit to the school all day.
