Section 1

Aims

Home learning (HL) is an invaluable and important opportunity for students to continue their learning outside of the timetabled curriculum. When HL tasks are completed effectively, they become an integral way of raising standards in achievement and attainment, encouraging young people to develop a positive attitude to learning that they will carry with them for the rest of their life. The foundations of effective HL practices should be established from the beginning of Year 7 and develop progressively across the Key Stages through to Year 13

Section 2

Our Home Learning Platform

At Minsthorpe Community College, we use an online HL platform called Satchel: One. This platform allows teaching staff to set clear HL tasks and to communicate effectively with students and their parents/carers. The platform can be downloaded via an app to a phone or tablet or equally can be accessed through a desktop computer. From home, students and parents/carers can keep track of all HL tasks and when the work is due. Work can be submitted online or brought back to the lesson and students can 'tick off' tasks as they complete them. All HL will now be set via Satchel: One, however, staff will be made aware of any students who have accessibility issues at home. Suitable alternative provisions will be put in place in these circumstances. In addition, staff in Core subjects also set tasks on SPARX Reading, SPARX Maths & Educake; subjects across the curriculum may use app based Home Learning platforms, but these will never incur a charge for parents and students to use.



Section 3

Setting Home Learning – Central Home Learning, Curriculum Areas and Teaching Staff

KS3 students follow a centrally set Knowledge Organiser programme complemented by additional app-based tasks for core subjects.

Year 10 students also follow the Knowledge Organiser programme supplemented by subject specific Home Learning.

Year 11 students are set subject specific Home Learning by their classroom teachers.

All students at Minsthorpe will have access and entitlement to HL. Teachers are encouraged to set a variety of tasks which allows students to build on the curriculum that they follow in College. HL will give students the opportunity to practice, review and recall newly acquired knowledge and skills and help them to make links to the next stage in their learning. Teachers and curriculum areas should ensure that subject specific Home Learning is suited to the needs and ability of the students. Appreciation of any SEND needs are vital. Once tasks are set, it is important that teachers check that HL has been completed and that any missed deadlines are recorded on Sims so that this can be monitored by the Director of Pedagogy and Practice and the Pastoral Team. Relevant and timely intervention will be put in place for students who are struggling to complete HL and we will support students in removing any challenges to them completing work outside the classroom.



Section 4

Creating a positive Culture Through Rewards and Celebrations

At Minsthorpe, we reward students for demonstrating our college's values of Motivation, Commitment and Care. This can be exemplified through consistent effort in completing HL tasks to a good standard and on time. The College will reward and celebrate these students in a number of ways, including:

- Achievement Points;
- Contact with parents/carers;
- Positive postcards;
- Certificates;
- Rewards assemblies;
- The Knowledge Organiser programme includes a half-termly assembly focused on celebrating and rewarding Home Learning completion.

Individual Curriculum Areas may also employ their own rewards systems.



Section 5

The Purpose of Home Learning

for Students

- Allows practice and consolidation of work completed in class;
- Allows preparation for future class work and for examinations;
- Vital for academic success;
- Motivates and challenges students to use other learning resources;
- Provides opportunities to develop individual work, independent learning and research skills in project work;
- Allows for the assessment of students' progress;
- Trains students to become independent learners and develops skills such as time management;
- Encourages students to be responsible for their own learning;
- Provides opportunities for parental co-operation and support;
- For year groups set Knowledge Organisers for HL, completion of HL will help students prepare for Knowledge Assessments;
- Help students to know more, remember more and do more.

for Staff

- Gives further opportunity for staff to assess individual work;
- Informs future planning and teaching;
- Gives opportunity for students to regularly review their learning and understanding of new content and knowledge;
- Gives opportunity for students to be prepared for forthcoming lessons;
- Provides an opportunity to liaise with parents/carers.

for Parents / Carers

- Gives an opportunity to engage with and support their child's learning within each different subject area and to review progress.



Section 6

KS4 and KS5 Subject Specific Home Learning

As well as the Knowledge Organiser Programme Year 10 students are set subject specific Home Learning on a fortnightly basis. Year 11 students are set subject specific Home Learning in preparation for GCSE examinations. Each Curriculum Area (CA) has a policy relating to HL. It is the responsibility of the Curriculum Team Leader to ensure that HL is set, and that the policy is adhered to.

Each policy details:

- The types of HL which might be set;
- The frequency of HL;
- How the task will be submitted;
- How HL is recorded and monitored within teams;
- How staff will provide feedback to students.

In Year 11 some CAs will set HL weekly or fortnightly, whereas others may set more project-based HL, once every half term. It is important that students are engaged in HL within all subject areas on a regular basis.

The aims and detail of each CA policy should be known by all staff teaching in that CA, and should adhere to the following principles:

- HL should be purposeful and integral to the scheme of work developing the scheme and enhancing its variety;
- It should be adapted to allow all students access to appropriate areas of the curriculum;
- Assistance and advice should be sought from Specialist Support wherever appropriate/needed;
- It should include tasks designed to encourage independence and self-motivation;
- Students should get feedback on the quality of HL and where possible this should form a part of the discussion with parents/carers about effort and progress within a subject;
- Appreciation should be shown during examination periods; however, HL should be set and recorded where revision is necessary. It is expected that students will be revising, but this should be explicit and measurable to ensure this is completed;
- Each CA should reward students for good effort or achievement in HL, just as class learning is rewarded;

Section 8

KS3 Knowledge Organisers and Centralised Home Learning

It is this College's **intent** for students within KS3 to complete HL based on Knowledge Organisers which is centrally monitored and recorded. The Knowledge Organiser programme will be complemented with app-based tasks for core subjects.

Students will be expected to:

- read for 30 minutes per week on the Sparx Reader programme;
- learn the weekly knowledge set in their Knowledge Organiser in every subject.

This should amount to 30 minutes revision every night at home

Every Monday, students will be set a Home Learning task on Satchel One. The task will direct the student to learn a section of the Knowledge Organiser. The sections will be categorised according to the two-week timetable. We will provide a timetable which details which subject should be studied and on what day as shown below:

Students will be provided with a workbook book to complete their HL in. Home Learning is set centrally on Satchel:One along with supporting resources. It should be noted that Satchel:One is not needed for Home Learning completion. Home Learning is checked by P&A mentors every Monday during P&A time.

Students who do not complete their HL or students who require further assistance will be required to attend a 'Knowledge Commitment Session' after school. This session is an extension of the school day and is compulsory. During these sessions, students will be supported in completing HL. These sessions are also used to identify any challenges to accessing and completing HL thus further support can be implemented.

Year 8 and 9 students will have additional Home Learning to complete on online platforms for Science and Maths. Students will be asked to complete tasks on Educake and Sparx. These tasks will be set, monitored, and reviewed by the Maths and Science department. Students will be supported in using these App based resources.

Section 9

Home Learning Links to the Learning & Teaching and Curriculum Policies

The aim and ethos of HL supports our vision and values towards Learning & Teaching in the classroom and the planned curriculum. HL plays an integral role in terms of students' learning & the implementation of the curriculum.

HL helps to strengthen our six Core Teaching Principles and gives students the opportunity to review and reinforce new content and skills taught within the classroom. Specifically, it helps develop the skills of retention and retrieval and the independent completion of tasks.

In addition, it supports our College Curriculum intent, particularly:

- Deepens students' understanding and develops their knowledge and skills in all subject areas;
- Ensures students are literate and numerate;
- Enriches students' learning experiences.



Section 10

Roles and Responsibilities

Students

- To routinely check Satchel: One for new tasks, including their deadlines;
- To submit HL tasks on or before the deadline to the best of their ability;
- To catch up with HL tasks when absent so learning is not missed or compromised;
- Problems with HL should be resolved before the deadline. If necessary, students should see the member of staff concerned for help.

Parent/Carer:

- Parents/carers are asked to support HL by taking an active interest in their child's work and provide a reasonable place where students can work, or encourage them to make use of the college facilities;
- Parents/carers should encourage students to meet deadlines and check Satchel: One for the work set and deadlines given;
- If parents/carers feel that insufficient or too much HL is being set, they should contact the teacher / CTL / CCTL who will investigate the situation.

Pastoral Team:

It is essential that the amount, regularity, and quality of HL can be monitored. The initial process and responsibility should lie in the Curriculum Areas. However, the Cross Curriculum Team Leaders will support Curriculum Areas to remove any potential barriers that students may experience when completing HL.



Section 11

Home Learning for SEND Students

The HL Policy for the College allows Curriculum Areas' discretion in the provision of HL for all students. It is important to bear in mind the nature and timing of HL for SEND students. Students with SEND may have difficulties regarding HL. Teachers should ensure that work is adapted to their level or reasonable adjustments and support is offered to mitigate any challenges to learning. Failure to complete adapted HL should be referred to Student Support. They will advise as to appropriate support or intervention. Parents/carers will be contacted regarding support for HL which will include working in Student Support for After College Home Learning Club, where help with HL is available. Staff should consult Student Provision Maps for any specific HL strategies.

The Knowledge Organiser programme has been designed to offer consistency in relation to Home Learning for KS3 pupils. The college's aim is for all students on a mainstream pathway to access this Home Learning. As a reasonable adjustment, the following support is available for students struggling with Home Learning completion:

- Knowledge Commitment sessions
- Extended Knowledge Commitment sessions
- Targeted Academic Support
- A dedicated Home Learning Club

Parents/carers will be contacted regarding support for HL which will include working in Student Support for After College Home Learning Club, where help with HL is available – change to:
